
Thank you Bethanne for spearheading this awesome event! We can't wait for next year!

That day was very cold so we had to put on lots of layers. We put on wetsuits then dry suit jackets then rain jackets, life jackets and helmets and got a brief safety lecture. We then hiked down a hill to the river through the thick Washington forest.

He liked the first half when there were rapids but did not like the second half when it started to rain and there weren't a lot of rapids. Arlo also had a great time. The White Salmon river is fed by snowmelt off of Mt. Adams. Some of the canyons that it meanders through are ancient collapsed lava tubes from the volcanic cascade mountains. The White Salmon used to be dammed up by condit dam but it was taken down. At the time this was the world's largest dam removal project. The White Salmon is one of the most popular raft locations in the world. The most famous rapid is Husum falls which is a 12 foot drop. Sadly we had to skip the falls because the water was running too high. But there were other rapids that we could go on the biggest ones being rattlesnake, granny snatcher and stair step. Everyone had a lot of fun rafting and would definitely do it again.
